



**My brother
is different.**


**Let me show you

sometimes gets so excited...**




... that he bites or hits me.

Sometimes when I talk to my brother...




... he ignores me.




**This is because he doesn't always understand

When I behave badly I get told off...




**... but my brother doesn't.

At mealtimes...




... my brother can't sit still.




This is because he needs lots of space and he gets upset if situations (like mealtimes) get too difficult for him.

trying to watch it.




He can't play with other children.

He will be in nappies for a long time.




MY BROTHER IS AUTISTIC


What I can do is....
